Attendance and lateness

PRIVATE STUDY TIME

You will be timetabled for on-site study in your empty block to assist you in your time management and embed good study habits.

On a Wednesday period 3,4 and 5, you will study off-site so that you can develop your own good work habits and learn to manage your workload.

Do not take on paid work during the school day.

Top tip - Do not take on more than 8 to 10 hours of paid work no matter when you do it.



Homework expectations

Homework will be set on a regular basis.

There is an expectation that you will do a minimum of 5 hours per subject per week in your study periods and in your free time.

If none is set, there are always things you can be doing.

Ask for additional work if you want to improve your grade.

Meet the deadlines! It's a slippery slope and a long way back!



Life as a P16 student

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In your reflection booklets, you'll be writing some thoughts about the following scenario.

Consider:

Where has the student made a bad decision?

What should they have done differently?

Is the student likely to succeed in their A-levels?



Jon has just finished his first term at P16.

Jon achieved 5s and 6s at GCSE without really having to try very hard.

Jon hasn't been doing his homework at A-level because he'd never done much homework at school.

When teachers tell him off he does some homework, but he doesn't put any effort into making it good.

Jon's just got his Praising Stars report, and he's disappointed by some low predicted grades and effort scores.

2 Minutes - write some thoughts in your booklet





- I. Where has the student made a bad decision? Jon didn't try hard at school, he could have done even better. A-levels are much harder than GCSE, so he won't get away without doing homework and needs to put in effort.
- 2. What should they have done differently? Jon should have seen PI6 as a fresh start, and worked harder to achieve his best.
- 3. Is the student likely to succeed in their A-levels? No we know that even the brightest students need to work hard to succeed.





Top tips for succeeding at A-level

- 3. Work with your teachers and support staff
